The Community of Constituents initiative is a statewide movement of nearly 1,000 organizations, with more than 300 affiliated members, working together to transform the system of care so that all Californians can age with dignity, choice, and independence. This initiative includes the Sacramento-based [California Collaborative for Long Term Services and Supports \(LTSS\)](#) and [20 county-level Regional Coalitions](#). It unifies parts of the LTSS advocacy world that have historically worked separately: aging and disability, rural and urban, health plans and community-based organizations, and consumers and providers. In 2018, the California Collaborative and Regional Coalitions are advocating for an LTSS system that includes integrated care and service delivery, updated reimbursement processes, investments in workforce development and caregiver support, sustainable and stable housing strategies, and attention to the care needs of middle-income Californians. In addition, they are working to identify and engage future LTSS leaders. Together, they serve as a visible, organized, trusted, and consumer-focused voice for LTSS efforts.

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California Collaborative for Long Term Services and Supports

At a Glance

The California Collaborative for Long Term Services and Supports (LTSS) is a coalition of 36 statewide organizations and 15 affiliates who work to advance aging and disability policy for all populations who need long-term services and supports. [Member organizations](#) represent people, caregivers, providers, advocates, legal services, labor, and insurers. Collectively, Collaborative organizations act on behalf of millions of California seniors and people with disabilities, their families, and those who provide them with services and supports. Since its formation in 2011, the Collaborative has sponsored hundreds of policy conversations on LTSS issues, has met and collaborated with state and federal officials, and has been a voice at the California Legislature on behalf of LTSS and the populations who use these services. Giving equal importance to issues of aging and disability, the Collaborative serves as a valuable resource where diverse perspectives come together to make [recommendations](#) and act on policies that advance person-centered care and support the dignity, independence and well-being of aging and disabled Californians.

Guiding Principles

1. **Dignity:** The services are grounded in respect for the person who uses them and driven by the preferences of that person.
2. **Choice:** Access to all types of services is provided on an equal footing.
3. **Flexibility:** The services are comprehensive and flexible enough to meet changing needs and incorporate new modes of service and supports.
4. **Quality:** Public funding and oversight that values and rewards high-quality care.
5. **Legality:** The services are consistent with the legal rights of individuals who use them.
6. **Cultural Competence:** The services are appropriate and responsive to the needs of underserved populations.
7. **Accessibility:** The services and information about them are easy to locate and use and are physically and programmatically accessible.
8. **Affordability:** The services are cost-effective for the person and the system.
9. **Inclusive:** The system recognizes and supports the crucial role of high-quality paid and unpaid caregivers, including family caregivers, and emphasizes the importance of workforce development and training.
10. **Independence:** The services support maximum independence, full social integration and quality of life.

The Central Valley Long Term Support and Services (CVLTSS) Coalition grew out of the expanded efforts of the Elder Abuse Prevention Roundtable (EAPRT). EAPRT started in 1997 with 15 participants. Today the Coalition includes members from protective agencies, social services agencies, law enforcement, legal services, senior service providers, private attorneys, and advocates. The mission is to promote greater understanding of the long-term social service and support needs of older and dependent adults and to advocate for the development of public policies to most effectively target this population through service development and coordination. CVLTSS works in partnership with EAPRT, as well as additional organizations to inform and encourage providers and consumers to have a voice in statewide policy discussions. In 2018, CVLTSS plans to host a public, town hall-style event aiming to raise awareness of long-term services and supports barriers; solicit feedback; and discuss solutions.

Formed in 2009, the Orange County Aging Services Collaborative (OCASC) provides a network of services and support to older adults and their family caregivers so that they may experience a high quality of life in Orange County. OCASC promotes the importance of a person-centered, integrated system of services and supports that enables older adults to live more functional lives. OCASC members include nearly every nonprofit and governmental provider serving seniors in Orange County, acting as one coordinated voice to advocate on behalf of the county's elderly population. As more individuals desire to age in place, OCASC focuses on strengthening relationships with local elected officials to educate, empower, and build local champions to advocate on behalf of older adults and long-term services and supports (LTSS). The Collaborative produces annual policy statements, organizes an annual *Leadership Forum on Aging*, and conducts district visits to educate key stakeholders on the needs of seniors in Orange County. The Orange County Healthy Aging Initiative (OCHAI), a committee of OCASC, created the Older Adult Dashboard that has over 70 health, social, and economic indicators for Orange County's older adults.

The Council's mission is to advise, implement, and monitor community-based, long-term care planning; and to improve the coordination of home, community-based, and institutional services for older adults and people with disabilities. LTCCC has 40 members, representing consumers, advocates, and service providers. Additional representation includes city and county departments: Aging and Adult Services, Public Health, Mayor's Office on Disability and Housing, San Francisco Housing Authority, and the Municipal Transit Authority. LTCCC focuses on how service delivery systems interact to serve people and recommends ways to improve coordination and system interaction. In 2018, LTCCC and the Dignity Fund Coalition will produce a candidate town hall event for the mayoral candidates of the summer mayoral election.

The Adult & Aging Network (AAN) began in 2011 with the aim to advocate for individuals with mental health disabilities in Santa Barbara, Ventura, and San Luis Obispo counties. In 2015, the Coalition's mission shifted to improve countywide planning and coordination of services for older adults and adults with disabilities. 
